It will help students: • Answer the call to communion and mission in specific ways of life and activity • Understand what is meant by a "communion of disciples" • Clarify the ordering and structure of the Church • Examine the Church's ministries of Word and Sacrament • Understand the Church's evangelizing activity in the world: to transform human society in the light of the Gospel • See that being one, holy, catholic, and apostolic is both what the Church is, as well as what the Church is called to become • Understand the role of Mary in the life of the Church

It will help students: Realize how the liturgy is understood as the work of the Church and the work of God Examine the sacraments as visible signs Understand how and why the sacraments confer the gift of grace Clarify the meaning of "the institution of the sacraments by Christ" Examine a brief history of the early development of each of the seven sacraments Grasp the importance of Baptism as the sacramental action of the Church that makes us Christian and Catholic Understand the history and theology of the Eucharist Examine the theological and pastoral implications of the Church's sacramental life

	 Familiarize students with the antecedent historical context of the Council Familiarize students with the Popes behind the Council Assist students in understanding that Vatican II addressed an extraordinary number of issues, and familiarize them with ten basic principles of reform Explore vital Church teachings and practices, first through a historical examination of the vision set forth by the major documents of the Second Vatican Council and then in light of the Church's contemporary life and practice

Course Goals and Objectives	This course emphasizes that the Christian moral life begins with the experience that we are loved by God in an unimaginable, unfathomable way and that living faithfully is our attempt to respond to the gift of that love. This course will help students: • Understand the meaning of Christian morality • Explain why morally good choices lead to true human fulfillment • Examine and explain what the true human goods are and why they lead to human fulfillment in this life and in the next • Clarify what is meant by "loving others" • Realize and embrace the Christian's moral responsibility to take an active role in the work of establishing the reign of God • Understand the reality and meaning of "conscience" • Comprehend the nature of "sin" and its power in individual lives and in the world • Understand how resurrection faith and Christian hope impact the human process of conversion • Examine issues of medical ethics from a Catholic perspective
